The classification system used here is based on one developed by Nick Young of the China Development Brief in "NGOs: the Diverse Origins, Changing Nature and Growing Internationalization of the Species" (2005). It has been updated in the following ways: (1) faith-based organizations were removed as a stand-alone category, as most are included in these other categories; (2) campaigning organizations are incorporated under humanitarian relief and development organizations; (3) private nonprofit universities, schools, and hospitals have been added; and (4) the category of professional associations has been broadened.
